For Patients Without Insurance

• Gilead's Medication Assistance Program

The Gilead Medication Assistance Program provides assistance to uninfected individuals in the United States who do not have insurance or who need financial assistance to pay for Truvada[®] for PrEP. To learn about eligibility, call 1-855-330-5479 Monday – Friday, 9 a.m. – 8 p.m. (Eastern Standard Time). Download the enrollment form at http://start.truvada.com/Content/pdf/Medication_Assistance_Program.pdf.

Once the patient is approved for enrollment in the program, Gilead's specialty pharmacy will contact the prescribing clinician, confirm the prescription information, and mail 30 days of Truvada[®] to the prescribing clinician or the patient. Typically, the enrollment period is six months unless circumstances change (e.g., the patient gets new health insurance). The specialty pharmacy will contact the patient's clinician each month to confirm that a 30-day supply should be refilled. Before the 6-month initial enrollment period ends, a re-enrollment application will be faxed to the clinician.

• Partnership for Prescription Assistance (PPA) Program

The Partnership for Prescription Assistance (PPA) Program is designed to help uninsured Americans get the prescription medicines they need at no or low cost. Patients can find out if they are eligible by calling 1-888-4PPA-NOW (1-888-477-2669) or visiting the PPA Web site at http://www.pparx.org.

Patient Access Network Foundation (PAN)

The PAN Foundation offers assistance to people with chronic or life-threatening illnesses for whom cost limits access to critical medical treatments. Eligibility criteria include: (1) Patient should be insured and insurance must cover the medication for which patient seeks assistance; (2) Patient needs to be HIV positive, or be HIV-uninfected and at high risk of acquiring HIV, or be HIV-uninfected and have been exposed to bodily fluids potentially containing HIV within the last 72 hours; (3) Patient must reside and receive treatment in the United States; and (4) Patient's income must fall below 500% of the Federal Poverty Level. CHECK YOUR INSURANCE PLAN

Your costs

- It's wise to check your insurance plan ahead of time to see what you may have to pay out of pocket while on PrEP · Find what your deductible is.
- · Find what drug tier that Truvada is on Figure out your total
- costs for medical visits routine blood work, and the prescription.
- Ask for help from doctor's office, pharmacist, local case manager.
- or insurance plan rep. Avoid Bronze plans if you can (they generally have higher costs). Silver, Gold and Platinum plans offer better coverage if you can afford them.

FIND A MEDICAL PROVIDER WHO SUPPORTS YOUR DECISION TO PrEP

Schedule an appointment

- Approach your medical provider about Truvada for PrEP prescription. • If s/he will prescribe, GREAT NEWS!
- If s/he doesn't know about PrEP but is willing to prescribe: 1) S/he can consult the US PHS's prescribing guidelines: Pre-Exposure Prophylaxis for the Prevention of HIV Infection (www.cdc.gov/hiv/prevention/research/prep/), and/or

MEDICAL VISITS, **BLOOD WORK**

If you encounter uncovered costs related to your medical visits and/or blood work, these options may help:

Public health clinics Some public health

clinics offer sliding fee scale for medical visits and blood work.

FSAs

- FSAs (Flexible Spending Accounts) are accounts set up with pre-tax dollars to help pay for out-of-pocket health
- care costs. FSAs have an annual limit of \$2,550, available
- through employers if offered. Enrollment is usually
- annual, so plan ahead.

GET YOUR PRESCRIPTION

PICK UP PRESCRIPTION

Pharmacy refills Plans vary in what they offer

- Your plan may: Vary in how you get meds (at pharmacy, mail order). Provide only 30-day refills Offer 90-day refills Make you initiate the monthly refill Have an auto-send
- function for refills Offer refills earlier than waiting 30 days
- ALSO:
 - In-network pharmacies will reduce your cost. Apply for Gilead's Co-Pav Card before going to pharmacy (URL next column).

 If pharmacy doesn't accept Co-Pay Card, keep pharmacy and sales receipts. Call the number on back of co-pay card. Submit paper work for payment.


